Honors In Action

We successfully completed our Honors in Action project for 2021. We looked into vaccine mandates in schools. Let me share a quote from our project that sums up our findings:

"There is a strong case to be made that mandating children to become vaccinated to attend school protects the public. There is also a strong case that the individual has sovereignty over the body. Since both sides have a valid argument, there is a need to educate and discuss the issues and come up with policy that balances both perspectives. The biggest question in our minds is whether that is possible in our current divisive political climate."

We should soon start working on our 2022 project. At least according to what I've been hearing, it sounds like it may be an interesting one.

College Project

Many of you were involved in with the College Project. Let me share with you a brief description of what we did from the college project application form:

"A small percentage of Stark State students are experiencing homelessness and the effects of the pandemic. A significant percentage of Stark State students deal with food insecurities on a daily basis, resulting in not knowing where their next meal is going to come from. Taking these factors into consideration, we wanted to help get information out to the general student population regarding the resources available on campus and help them navigate the process of obtaining assistance for these food insecurities. It was decided that the main project we would tackle would be the Mitten Tree this year. Based on last year's meeting with advisors Shari Brooks and Dave Sigmund we decided to continue with last year's following goals. Our first goal was to educate students on food insecurity and eliminate the stigmas associated with needing help from food pantries. The second goal was to generate more awareness about the resources available to students. The third goal was to generate an increased usage of the school's cupboard Spartan's Cupboard. Our fourth goal was to work directly with the advisors and the members of the counseling office regarding the food pantry. Our final goal was to continue and improve the ongoing project from last year."



The Ohio Region Awards Convention will be held on March 4-5, 2022 at Clark State College in Springfield, OH. It is also a celebration of the 35th Anniversary of the Ohio Region founded in 1987 with only 16 chapters. Today we are 40 chapters strong, 38 in Ohio and two located in West Virginia. Therefore, Phi Theta Kappa Regions are not contained within a state but by designated area.

The Convention will host Justin Oberndorf, who is a former award-winning teacher and is now a life coach for young adults. His parents, Louis and Rosemary Oberndorf, established the Phi Theta Kappa International Oberndorf Lifeline to Completion Scholarship for students in need. We are also working on a second keynote speaker, but we cannot say as they are yet to commit.

There is no need to wait for your birthday to buy your plates. The BMV will prorate your existing plates, you pay the \$35.00 fees plus a one-time fee of \$15.00 and the plate is yours!
